The terrible floods, Myrna, Dora, Genevieve, you and I so many moved into the Toppenish Community Center as we provided shelter and meals for the many families. It was in the middle of the night, Myrna came and told me we are opening up the TCC, I grabbed me meds, sweaters, jackets, and blankets to share, never left until it was cleaned and vacant. It was hard tiresome work, but the thankful meals as we broke bread, made it worth it. The first night, there was probably right of us, fill up carts, line them up. Paper goods, diapers, formula, bottles, cough syrup, Tylenol, food, adult diapers, personal items, brushes, rubber bands, if there was a need for it, it was in the carts. We got big bags of candy and sandwich bags, made treat bags. Had children go on detail to gather garbage, and they did that twice daily and got a treat bags. It was heartbreaking. Elders did not to leave their homes, in the end they were more comfortable and we knew they were taken care of. My son gave up his TV and movies, shared so we had a little theatre area. My late husband and my son were out sandbagging, came in to eat and hit it again. But it was the laughter as we worked together in the kitchen preparing meals. I remember someone said I have never had so much fun peeling potatoes like here! We were each to take care of our people, we did that together. My best memory that I shared with Sister Jan. Rest in peace in those glorious halls of gold, your husband is waiting to greet you.
